Students who have entered UC San Diego before Fall 2015 and will be graduating after Summer 2015 may choose to follow either the new or old major requirements. Students graduating prior to Fall 2015 must follow the old major requirements.





#### **SONA: UPDATES AND REMINDERS**

Participants in SONA have the opportunity to make an important contribution to the research community in our department and/or the UCSD campus at large. Students enrolled in various Psychology, Cognitive Science, and Linguistics courses have the opportunity to serve as experimental subjects.

As a participant your time is as valuable as the researcher's. You are making an important contribution to the research community in our department and the UCSD campus at large. All participants are expected to behave in a professional manner, show up on time and provide notice to researchers if you need to cancel your appointment. You can expect all researchers and PI's to respect your time, describe the research you are contributing to and award your credit within 24 hours.

**VERY IMPORTANT:** Once you have accumulated **TWO** unexcused no-shows during one quarter, you will be limited in the studies available to you through SONA. Your account may remain active, but no studies will appear to be available. If this happens to you, you will need to ask your instructor if you have any other research participation options at that point. Instructors are not required to accommodate your request once more than two unexcused no-shows have been accumulated.

#### New Core? Old Core? What Gives?

We have added some new Core classes to our offerings effective Fall 2015! We hope you will agree that this is a positive change. But it has the potential to be confusing! So here is the bottom line:

## SO REALLY, WHAT IS THE DEAL WITH THE NEW MAJORS?

Here's the scoop. Our old requirements hadn't been updated since some of our faculty were students... Our new major requirements are more up-to-date with those of other top-notch Psychology program around the country. While some B.S. students require the advanced understanding of calculus covered in the Math 20 series for their Psychology research work and future careers, for many B.S. students the Math 10 series provides adequate background for the research and career endeavors they plan to pursue. And all students would benefit from taking a Research Methods class. Plus, there was a great advantage to students to have their Area of Specialization recognized on their degree.

So our faculty got to work, carefully examining our course offerings and our students' interests. They came up with new requirements for the BA and the BS, as well as six BS specialities for students to choose from. Our new majors are the result of lots and lots and LOTS of work, time, and thought, and we hope that you find one that reflects the academic paht most of interest to you!

You may have noticed that one of the biggest differences between the old majors and the new majors can be found in their Formal Skills requirements. Students following the old BA major requirements were required to complete at least one Calculus course of three required Formal Skills; students following the new BA major requirements can complete their degree with just two required Formal Skills, including Research Methods, Logic, and Calculus. Students following the old BS major had to complete a full year of the Math 20 series (Calculus for Science and Engineering Students), while students following the new major must complete Research Methods and two Calculus courses from either the Math 10 or 20 series.

Our Upper Division requirements were also adjusted; we went from requiring 5 Core classes (out of a possible 6) to requiring 4 Core classes (out of a possible 7). For the Bachelors of Science with Areas of Specialization, students are now required to take the Core class(es) that correspond to their chosen area. And all students have the opportunity to take one additional Elective class of their choice (as we removed one Core requirement, but our total number of required classes stayed the same).

Remember, the new majors go into effect during Fall 2015; you won't be able to officially switch until then. But you can start following the guidelines for your chosen new major now. To find out which major is best for you, look at the differences on our website.

### THE NUMBERS GAME

You may have noticed that some of our classes are being renumbered! To help better organize our new major courses, we made a few small changes. The following changes go into effect in Fall 2015:

- PSYC 103 becomes PSYC 122 (not a Core)
- PSYC 163 becomes PSYC 100 (new Core)
- PSYC 107 becomes PSYC 116

It may be used for reference purposes such as for graduate school and job applications. Members have the opportunity to present research at scientific meetings, and to participate in competitions.

Psi Chi is a part of the Association of College Honor Societies and is an affiliate of the American Psychological Association (APA) and the Association for Psychological Science (APS).
