Thank you for your interest in doing research in the UC San Diego Psychology Department! Our labs strongly value the contributions of undergraduate students and the opportunity to provide a welcoming work environment that respects the full spectrum of human diversity in race, ethnicity, gender identity, age, socioeconomic status, national origin, sexual orientation, disability, and religion.

This application will ask you about a broad array of skills and experiences, but it is by no means expected that you have all these skills. Faculty understand that, for many students, this will be their first lab experience and opportunity to start developing these skills. Please also make sure to include any relevant experiences you have outside of research, which, in addition to technical skills, could include things like babysitting, working, and volunteering in your community. We value a diverse range of skillsets, experiences, and perspectives in our labs.

An important purpose of this application is to streamline the process for both you and potential host labs, by reducing the number of times you have to email individual faculty inquiring about open positions. A second important purpose of this application is to better understand the full spectrum of interests and backgrounds that students are bringing to our labs, so that we can continue to improve the way that our department welcomes and trains students from all backgrounds.

Once you complete this application, your responses will be reviewed by Psychology faculty members who will reach out to you directly if they believe there is a potentially good match. After completing this application, you are still welcome (encouraged, even!) to contact faculty members directly via email to indicate your strong interest in joining their lab, and provide more detailed information, as applicable.

If you are not matched with a lab for next quarter, but are still interested in getting involved in research, we encourage you to re-apply to be matched in the following quarter! Because new applications will be solicited each quarter, we encourage you to type your responses in a separate Google Doc and then paste them into this form once you are ready to submit your full application.
